## Acknowledgement of Country

Wyndham City Council recognises Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the First Custodians of the lands on which Australia was founded. We acknowledge the Bunurong and Wadawurrung people as the Traditional Custodians of the lands on which Wyndham is being built. We pay respect to Ancestors and Elders who always have, and always will, care for Country and community today and for future generations.



## Background

Council delivers a wide range of services, programs, facilities and advocacy initiatives that contribute to building a strong and vibrant community. Good financial management into the future means making choices about how we provide and prioritise these. Input from our community is a vital part of the budget planning process as it helps inform and guide our decision making and consider how we might plan to better address their priorities.

From 24 January to 20 February 2022, the Wyndham community were provided with a range of opportunities to suggest an idea for Council to consider when developing the draft Annual Plan and Budget 2022/23.

The aim of the engagement process was to gather community input as to how to allocate Council's budget to further the priorities identified by the Wyndham community during the [Help Shape Wyndham's Future project](#).

The [Help Shape Wyndham's Future project](#), was the community engagement process that refreshed the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision and also informed the development of the Council Plan 2021-25, Long Term Financial Plan and the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan 2021-25. There were a number of opportunities to provide input, including deliberative engagement which is required under the Local Government Act 2020.

The deliberative engagement took place via five placed based Community Conversations with groups of community members that broadly reflected the Wyndham community. During the Community Conversation, each group developed a list of [Place Based Priorities](#). These Place Based Priorities help us understand the unique needs of our community and were used to inform the development of the Council Plan 2021-25.

As such, ideas submitted for the draft Annual Plan and Budget 2022/23 needed to reflect these Place Based Priorities, and contribute the attainment of the Council Plan and ultimately the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision.

In addition, ideas related to the COVID-19 recovery were also sought.

## Community engagement approach

**The community engagement approach was made up of four distinct opportunities:**

- Ideas submitted by the community via, The Loop, Council's online community engagement platform
- Pop up conversation events where the community had the opportunity to talk with Councillors and Council Officers:
  - Friday 4 February- Point Cook
  - Sunday 6 February- Little River
  - Friday 11 February- Tarneit
  - Sunday 13 February- Werribee
- Communities of Burma Engagement Workshop –Wednesday 23 February (view a report from this workshop in Appendix 2).
- Direct feedback sent to Council via email or hardcopy.

A total of 433 ideas were submitted throughout the community engagement opportunities.

The community engagement opportunities were promoted extensively prior to and throughout the four-week campaign.





The representation of responses from community members via The Loop is shown below:


**Age overview of community members who contributed via The Loop.**



Each of the ideas submitted by the community have been reviewed by Council officers and considered in the planning of the draft Annual Plan and Budget for 2022/23.

# Advocacy

Many of the community responses relate to the range of infrastructure and services that Council is responsible for delivering. However, some of the community responses fall into the jurisdiction of the State and Federal Government. For example, the State Government is responsible for planning and providing government schools. This includes choosing the location of schools, deciding when those schools will be built and coordinating the design and construction of schools.

They are also responsible for building and managing freeways and arterial roads (including but not limited to the Princes Freeway, Ballan Road and Point Cook Road). The provision of hospitals, health services and police and justice services are also the responsibility of the State, and the Federal Government is responsible for health funding.

One of Council's key roles is that of advocate and we have a strong and strategic approach to [advocacy](#). We work with relevant stakeholders and Federal and State Government, to communicate the needs of our community and seek commitments and ultimately the delivery of vital infrastructure and services. This occurs in a variety of ways including but not limited to public campaigns, formal submissions, meetings with Ministers and their advisors and maintaining ongoing relationships with key government departments and peak statutory representative.



## Next Steps

The proposed Annual Plan and Budget 2022/23 will be presented to the Council Meeting on 26 April. Following this, it will be on public exhibition for a four week period.

There are also a number of underground services between the railway line and the freeway that will need to be avoided, in particular an oil pipe line. Any bridge structure will be difficult and expensive to construct, with funding needed from State Government. There is no drive-in cinemas close by and lots of people travel afar to experience these. Therefore, I believe the whole community would really enjoy a drive-in cinema in Werribee. Currently there is a lack of suitable rehearsal spaces and also a lack of small, affordable performance spaces. Creating performance spaces that seat 100-150 would provide affordable spaces for artists and groups that would enable them to build their audiences and hone their craft. Even smaller boutique spaces of 60-100 would allow for activities such as rehearsed readings of plays or poetry slams. A vibrant arts culture requires a variety of spaces that can be adapted to the different needs of different art forms. Wyndham has an amazing cultural mix - the art and the ideas are here - but space is needed to develop them and to showcase them. There are also artisanal workshop spaces in other councils that help to stimulate crossover ideas between art forms. This model could be developed in Wyndham as well. A space for local performing arts	<p>I run an independent professional theatre company and have done so since 2003. The short of this statement - local performing is woefully neglected in Wyndham. We are an 'outlier' when it comes to performing arts. Yet I speak to some individual persons (including some councillors) and hear genuine understanding and support.</p> <p>To make it a reality we need purpose built facilities. Without it, it's like saying - we support kids learning to swim in Wyndham but there's no swimming pool. So it's not going to happen. My company, through covid, was in danger of completely shutting down. I was already earning little and did most of my work in kind (aka 'free'). I knew I had to step up to contribute to the household.</p> <p>I write, develop and produce plays. Real Australian stories. I work with youth from diverse backgrounds and get them to tell THEIR stories. I work with a team of actors, backstage crew, creatives but our opportunities are dwindling. We simply need a small 100-150 seat theatre to support local performing arts in Wyndham. Big rehearsal space with retractable seating (so no need for two buildings), storage and tech instalment. We'd fill it - all year. I'm now working with a local Maori performing arts group. I'm planning my next youth drama program. But we need a purpose build space.</p> <p>So please please asap build a smallish dedicated performing arts space. Give us the space and we'll make it work, we'll fill it both onstage and in audience. One example - I wrote Jack and Millie, 2019/20. We performed it at Saltwater amphitheatre March 2020, thanks to Bob. It has been selected as 1 of only 6 plays for this year's VCE drama playlist. We're touring the play but received no funding. The cost of hiring rehearsal space, equity actor rates, van hire, accommodation will suck out everything I have.</p> <p>Please build a small theatre. Please let us run it and show you what we can achieve. Please let us have input into what is needed to make it work.</p>	Manager Community Planning & Development Cliff Eberly	Council has been successful in receiving a grant from the State Government through the Growing Suburbs Fund for the redevelopment of the Wyndham Cultural Centre. As part of the proposed redevelopment additional dedicated performing spaces will be built to compliment the large theatre at that site. This dedicated performing space will be a smaller studio theatre, which will accommodate performances and rehearsals for local theatre companies and dance groups. The community will have further opportunity to give feedback on the development of this space in the first half of 2022.

The pedestrian paths are old and narrow and not really suitable for rollerblades and roller skates (due to Covid, the number of these users skyrocketed).</p> <p>The location of the reserve is slightly lower than residential areas surrounding, and the drainage system requires urgent attention. Pedestrian / Bike footbridge to connect Werribee South side to Grange/River	I would like to see a footbridge built to enable residents in Grange, Riverwalk and Westleigh Gardens to connect with Werribee South side. This would service many residents and students to safely get to the schools and shopping precinct on this side and elevate road traffic for those that could otherwise walk or ride into this part of Werribee. This could potentially link up from the river trail access at Doolan Street to the area of Vineyard Terrace. It would provide a much safer option and also connect this other side of Werribee to the walking trails. Thankyou.	Manager City Transport Melissa Falkenberg	As part of the development of the Riverwalk Estate a path connection will be provided towards the existing outfall sewer bridge over the Werribee River, next to the freeway. There some remaining missing sections of path (eastern side of the river and under the freeway) which are located on land managed by the Department of Transport, Melbourne Water and Parks Victoria, which Council is advocating for State Government funding. In addition, the Riverwalk Estate development plan identified another potential bridge location across the Werribee River near Synnot Street. This is predominately for sporting clubs outside of Werribee South (as WS doesn't have any) to train in the evenings two or three times a week. Hence, not only does Council not upgrade the roads and fix the potholes and drainage, but they see fit to send more traffic to Werribee South at night to further dilapidate the roads. Astoundingly, not one local resident has requested that these lights are installed. Why does our Council fail to ask or to listen to residents' needs? There is an urgent need for comprehensive traffic modelling and network assessments for the area. Sealing of the limited car parking on Beach Road is a recent example of the lack of forward planning. While the sealing is very welcome, it has done nothing towards increasing the parking capacity. The traffic issue in Cayleys Road goes to the heart of the urgent need for traffic modelling. 

## Acknowledgement of Country



Wyndham City Council recognises Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the First Custodians of the lands on which Australia was founded. ## Background

Council delivers a wide range of services, programs, facilities and advocacy initiatives that contribute to building a strong and vibrant community. Good financial management into the future means making choices about how we provide and prioritise these. Input from our community is a vital part of the budget planning process as it helps inform and guide our decision making and consider how we might plan to better address their priorities.

In January and February 2022, the Wyndham community were provided with a range of opportunities to suggest an idea for Council to consider when developing the draft Annual Plan and Budget 2022/23.

There were a range of opportunities for community members to submit their ideas for the Budget.

This report provides an overview of the Communities of Burma Engagement Workshop held on Wednesday 23 February 2022.

### [Communities of Burma - Engagement Workshop Overview](#)

The purpose of the Engagement Workshop was to provide members from the communities of Burma with an opportunity to discuss their ideas for Wyndham and their local community.

The 48 attendees were provided with an overview of the Wyndham City and the roles of each level of government, and the budget process. The attendees then broke into four groups of 12 to produce a range of ideas to be considered by Council when developing the budget.

A consolidated overview of the ideas raised by all groups is below.

### [Ideas Overview](#)

A number of ideas were raised by community members who attended the workshop.

The ideas have been broken up into the themes of Youth Services, Sport and Recreation, Open Space, Education and Employment, Community Spaces, Community Safety, Support Services, Communication and Engagement and Programs and Events.

A response from Council to each theme has also been provided below.

### **Youth Services**

1. Youth Development programs – working with cultural groups to support youth
  - a. Support parents to help keep kids in school
  - b. Invest in early programs to get our youth off to a good start – importance of education and getting ready for the right job (if not university)
  - c. Work closely with Community Groups to understand specific needs
2. Work with settlement agencies to support young people
3. Support young people in understanding and attaining their goals
4. Support for boys who don't want to complete VCE – what other job options are there for them?
5. Low-cost options that support young people from the community coming together
6. Community safety improvements – particularly for youth
7. Safety and security
  - a. Education and training programs for young people, in particular young people disengaged from school

- b. Drug awareness programs (for all young people)
- c. Connection young people with police (in a safe, information sharing way)
- d. Supporting parents to engage/support their children
- e. After school programs to help young people stay at school
- 8. There are not many opportunities for young people to get involved in – Council needs to focus on activities to keep young people engaged so they are not engaged with alcohol or drugs (mentoring, sporting programs, music programs)
- 9. We need to have more multi functions facilities for young people to connect at, to do sport and other activities
- 10. There are not enough activities happening on weekends, especially for young people and they go and spend time with friends and undertake antisocial behaviour

**Council Response:** Council has a wide range of youth programs provided by Youth Services. As part of this service area of Council, there are a wider range of youth volunteering roles to support young people in Wyndham to be involved in live youth events, multicultural projects and climate advocacy. Council also operated the Street Surfer Bus, which has been an effective way of engaging young people in parks and open space after-hours and in other places and spaces that young people like to gather. Feedback on specific community needs is always welcomed and Council are happy to discuss these further with members of the Burmese community.

### Sport and Recreation

1. Increase access to sporting facilities – can't find available soccer pitches (and even harder if not a member of a club)
2. A space to play cane ball
3. Outdoor and indoor volleyball facilities that are affordable
4. Cost of Eagle Stadium is high and unaffordable for some community members
5. Need another swimming pool in the city (which perhaps offers free entry)
6. Reduced fee to use spaces for community events and sport activities

**Council Response:** Council works closely with sporting clubs to provide access to a wide range of sport and recreation programs in Wyndham. Through State Government grant programs like Get Active Victoria, families can apply for vouchers to reduce the cost of participating in club sport and by partnering with organisations like Football Empowerment, Council is providing more ways for young people to participate in sport, without having to join a club. The current model for providing aquatics is based on two large scale regional facilities located in Hoppers Crossing and Tarneit each servicing large catchments (10km / 20min by car).

Council works closely with sporting clubs and groups across the municipality. Staff from our sport and recreation department would be keen to meet members of the Burmese community to work on a way to get more members of the community active and assist with access to local facilities.

## **Open Space**

1. Community Gardens around the City – support by Council
2. Activate Werribee South Beach so families don't have to travel out of the City – for swimming and fishing
3. Facilities in Open Space needs to be improved – particularly facilities that support families coming together (BBQ, Shade, Tables and Chairs)
4. More and different types of trees so Wyndham looks greener
5. Waste collection - we need clean city and people are dumping rubbish – we need to educate leaders to encourage community to keep the city clean
6. Parks to include gym equipment as gym memberships are expensive

**Council Response:** Council has successfully worked with Life Saving Victoria to provide lifeguards at the Werribee South beach during the two previous Summers and provides outdoor gym equipment at a number of parks in new and established parts of Wyndham. Parks and open space continue to feature prominently in community feedback and Council's work to create an environmentally sustainable and green city will continue through tree planting and waste education initiatives.

Council has received significant feedback in relation to provision of open space and parks. The community have said clearly that they would like to see open space and parks developed to cater for middle-years, families and friends into the future. Council is taking this feedback into consideration and will have more to say in the coming months in relation to how we will address this feedback.

## **Education and Employment**

1. Community spaces to assist groups coming together to talk about culture and history – this could be done at schools where there is space, but they are closed on weekends
2. East Werribee critical – we need the local jobs to eventuate
3. University Campus needed – we don't want our kids to not have the opportunity to go to University locally
4. Manor Lakes P-12 – too many portables, safety issues, parking issues (train passengers in nearby streets)
5. We need more schools and universities, most of the buildings are old and the spaces are too small for number of children, especially the indoor/outdoor spaces for sport, rainy days
6. Many families can't afford tuition fees and children are also mostly on iPads after schools, a homework club for community can help
7. Jobs are too far, people had to get up early in the morning and go with train to get to work

**Council Response:** East Werribee and the provision of high-quality education are high profile advocacy priorities for Council. The Schools for Wyndham campaign identifies that there is a shortfall in the provision of primary and secondary schools in Wyndham and requests for additional State Government investment to improve access. Through the Department of Education, the State Government provides assistance with school fees. Council is able to host education and cultural focused activities at local community centres. Specifically, Council is willing to work with the Burmese community to speak with the State Government about access to facilities to provide an opportunity for the community members to come together and ensure their next generation understand both history and language of their community.

Council is very active in the Social and Economic Inclusion space. Through the Opportunity Wyndham initiative Council is linking local businesses who are looking to employ local people with local people looking for work. Opportunity Wyndham works closely with Jobs Victoria and jobactive service providers to connect job vacancies in Wyndham to education and employment pathways, especially in industries and sectors where there is growing demand and need for workers. Council's Jobs Victoria Advocate is available to meet with any Wyndham resident who is looking for work.

As a large employer in Wyndham, the Council could assist young members of the community with work experience opportunities and support into vacant roles at Council. The Council would be happy to work with the community on how we could promote these opportunities to the community.

### **Community Spaces**

1. A dedicated multicultural community space - current community centres aren't reflective of a welcoming space for community members (feels too official)
2. More facilities to meet and connect- availability is an issue
  - o A welcoming centre includes:
    - Happy environment
    - people they know
    - people that look like them
    - understand culture

**Council Response:** To keep pace with Wyndham's growth Council is continually building new family centres and community centres. Through Council's Neighbourhood Hubs Unit community centres are staffed by people from the local community, who speak community languages and have networks locally. Council works closely with community groups to activate these facilities with close to 80% of all activities taking place within a community centre being led by the community. Council will continue to engage local communities to help inform the development of new community centres.

Again, Council would be happy to meet with members of the Burma community to better understand unmet need and where possible assist with providing community space. Further to Council's response in relation to Education and Employment, Council is happy to advocate to the State Government to see where schools closed on the weekend and during school holidays could be used by the community.

### **Community Safety**

1. Lights in parks to promote safety – walking and exercise. Mention was made of park behind Hoppers Crossing CFA station
2. Basic training on personal safety and road safety
3. Safety is an issue, community have had burglars coming to the house
4. Too many cars in the street

**Council Response:** Council's role in community safety includes planning for and ensuring the safe design of urban areas and buildings, environmental health, enforcing local laws related to parking and city presentation and programs that focus on issues such as gambling harm, family violence and racism. Law enforcement for criminal activity like theft is the responsibility of the State Government and should be reported to Victoria Police. Council has a number of ongoing projects to improve lighting and safe design in public spaces and will continue to maintain and improve open space so that it is safe for community use.

The CEO meets regularly with Victoria Police and can raise the matters above and see if they would be willing to meet with the community to better understand and support their requests.

### **Support Services**

1. Employment programs that support the qualities people already have – that assist in leading to a job
2. Support for adults to teach their kids – a challenge when many adults don't speak English well and their kids are learning in English
3. Financial management/budgeting sessions
4. Parent groups important – but need a focus on non-English speaking groups
5. New residents find it hard to get rental properties – could Council bring together Agents to assist?
6. Programs to support the communities of Burma to grow and develop
7. Community would like to have access to grants and spaces to pass on the language and culture to younger generation
8. It's hard for community to apply for jobs online, the system is confusing
9. More support to start a small business or grow business
10. We need more resources at libraries in different languages
11. Mental health - community champions refer to mental health services

**Council Response:** Since 2018, Wyndham City Council has delivered social and economic inclusion initiatives, which seek to provide learning and employment pathways to Wyndham residents who face barriers to employment. Through Opportunity Wyndham, Council facilitates a network of local training organisations and employment services providers. Opportunity Wyndham engages local employers to link them to local people looking for work and provides support to those businesses to adopt inclusive recruitment practices through the use of the Inclusive Industries Toolkit. The recent State Government Job Advocates program helps people to find the services locally to support career and employment. Since July 2021 Council has used this funding to support over 400 jobseekers to be referred to local services. This program is funded by the State Government for another 18 months.

### **Communications and Engagement**

1. Increasing communication so the community knows programs are available
2. More engagement with all CALD communities
3. Increased community development with communities of Burma
4. Community, especially smaller community don't receive updates about council services and programs or if we receive them it's too late to register (videos with subtitle was identified as the best way to communicate information)

5. Everything is online or over the phone and harder for community to access and complete the paperwork
6. Find trusted sources that have direct engagement with community groups such as:
  - WCEC is an organisation that has close contact with communities and can send information to community groups

**Council Response:** Council is committed to making Wyndham a welcoming community for people of all cultural backgrounds. As a rapidly growing community with half of its residents born overseas, building cultural understanding across cultures is essential to growing community strength. In 2022, Council will launch a series of Welcoming City forums to engage community leaders on this subject.

In 2020, Council advocated to the State Government for dedicated funding to increase engagement with CALD community leaders regarding public health messaging and Covid-19 response and recovery. Launched in November 2020, the Local Partnerships has met continuously and had the Wyndham funding extended to June 30, 2022 and includes funding for local community organisations to employ bicultural workers, convene a community of practice, coordinate public health messaging and provide support.

Council also undertakes the following as part of the CALD communications strategy:

- Translations for printed materials including mail-outs on critical information including COVID and vaccinations
- Key services such as Libraries and Kindergartens have key information brochures in languages other than English
- Translated social media and targeted communications
- Promotion of the TIL translation service through Wyndham News and Customer service
- Customer Service staff who are able to assist with language queries
- Videos in key languages spoken in Wyndham which use easy to understand inf graphics
- Language translation service available on corporate website and The Loop

Council would be happy to meet with members of the Burma community to better understand communications and engagement needs to ensure important communication is effective.

## Programs and Events

1. More activities for seniors (knitting and weaving) / programs for health and mental health / free transport to pick up elderly people
2. Annual and seasonal events for the community
3. We need more and new leaders, some leadership course to have new leaders in the community
4. Leaders can build relationship and share information with the community
5. More leadership and prevention drug and alcohol programs, it's most of the time too late to stop the problem and most service providers are outside Wyndham
6. Leadership opportunity for all ages / we need new leaders/ a course designed to train leaders
7. More volunteering opportunities to build confidence and increase job opportunities
8. Garden workshops about composting

**Council Response:** Wyndham City Council provides the Wyndham Building Blocks Leadership Program to support new leaders to grow and develop. Intake for this program takes place twice a

year and applications are invited from all members of the community. Through Council's community grants programs community groups and organisation can apply for funding to run events for community. Council's community training calendar also assists community groups and organisations to grow their membership and effectiveness.

## **Next steps**

The proposed Annual Plan and Budget 2022/23 will be presented to the Council Meeting on 26 April. Following this, it will be on public exhibition for a four week period.
