EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 Overview

ChatterBox Projects was engaged by Wyndham City Council to undertake some preliminary community engagement for the Wyndham Coastal Management Plan.

A range of methods and tools were used to engage with the community including four place-based pop-up consultations and an online survey.

During the community engagement activities, a wide range of people were engaged including children, young people and adults, visitors to the area and people who live on the Wyndham coast.

1.2 Key findings

The responses gathered during the consultation process included over 450 comments. These responses resulted from an online and hard-copy survey and place-based engagement activities. The engagement highlighted some key overall themes to be considered as part of the coastal management plan. It is recommended to read through all of the comments provided by the community in this report, as there are many isolated suggestions and ideas for the coast that have not been themed but are worthy of being noted.

What the community love and value on the Wyndham coast



119 respondents stated what they love or value on the Wyndham coast. More than 20% of respondents indicated that they loved that the Wyndham coast was close to home and the city, they valued the natural untouched environment (18.4%), the beaches (15.1%), the peace and quiet (12.6%), the natural beauty (10.9%) and the fishing (9.2%). They also loved the fact that it was easy to get to, the parks, the birds and wildlife and the walking and cycling paths. 'Unique' was a word often used to describe the Wyndham coast.

QUOTES:

"I value the uniqueness of the environment of the area, the river, estuary, red cliffs, the agricultural and cultural heritage, and the walking, bike path along the foreshore."

"The coastline is unique in that is generally free from housing development and has a rural/almost pristine feel about it."

"I love and value the scenery. It is such a beautiful spot. I like going for walks and swimming in the water. The bird life is fantastic and you see different kinds at different times of the year. The marine life is varied year around and sometimes you can spot dolphins! I love it here!"

"Untouched area of great development opportunity. Nice quite areas on the bay - not that far from Melbourne city. Some areas it almost feels like no-one has ever been there."

Key engagement themes

The information below outlines the major themes that emerged from the community through the engagement activities, including the survey and place-based engagement.

Most comments received were via the hard copy survey and online survey in response to the following questions.

- 1. What is your one big idea for the Wyndham coast? (122 comments)
- 2. What do you value or love about the Wyndham Coast? (119 comments)
- 3. Do you have any other comments about the Wyndham coast or the coastal management plan? (79 comments)

Walking & cycling trails



The most popular topic during the engagement centred around requests for new trails or the development of connections between existing walking and cycling trails across Wyndham.

There were over 70 specific comments mentioning walking and cycling trails; 50 via the online and hard copy surveys and a further 22 comments via the mapping tool. These included requests for the Bay trail to be extended, connections to be made between Point Cook Coastal Park and Werribee,

and Sanctuary Lakes and Wyndham Harbour, the walking trail to be extended from Wyndham Harbour to Campbells Cove and the linking of the Point Cook Coastal Park to the Cheetham Wetlands.

QUOTES:

"Improve the connection and access to the coast from the centre of Werribee- not just by car but via bike and other modes of transport."

"To have the Footpath/Cycle track extended, from Werribee Park down the west side of the Werribee River and crossing the river into the upstream end of Grahams Wetlands Reserve at Werribee South, to join with the existing foreshore path at Bellin Reserve and the existing path extended to connect with existing pathways at Saltwater Coast Wetlands at Point Cook."

"Cant wait for the bay trail to be completed so it connects all the way to Williamstown""

"Hopefully the plans will also include linking the Point Cook Coastal Park to the Cheetham Wetlands via the existing "Management vehicles only" trail. It would appear that this would be relatively easy to do and may save lives (when cyclists disappear into the confusing Point Cook maze, they could die of starvation trying to find their way out)!"

"I do think we need to fast track getting walking tracks made which connects Pt Cook Coastal Park to Werribee (via Werribee South)."

"At this stage as it would require minimal infrastructure and cost to link the bike trail that ends soon after crossing Skeleton Creek with a branch at the creek bridge that connects to the gravel road that runs around the border of the old Cheetham salt works at times next to the South Saltworks Moat."

"Bike path that connects the path that currently finishes at Sanctuary Lakes all the way through to Wyndham Harbour"

"Should connect the federation trail to the bay trail under the freeway"

"Put in walk and cycle paths along the entire length of the coastline (from Werribee South to Williamstown trail)"

"There should be a bike/running/walking path connecting Point Cook coastal park with Werribee south."

Keeping the coastline clean

Over 50 comments were raised (making this issue the second most popular topic raised during the engagement) about keeping the coastline clean. The top three issues regarding keeping the coastline clean were the current issue of the seaweed, rubbish being dumped along the coast and the need to clean up the beaches more regularly.

There were many comments about keeping the beach/es clean to enable people to swim.

QUOTES:

"Keep beaches clean/every time I come to the boatsheds I have to clean the beach"

"Clean up seaweed @ Wyndham Harbour, terrible smell"

"We really like to have a clean beach as at the moment there are no water areas that we can go for a swim"

"The area at the end of Cunnunghams Rd has a huge problem with rubbish being dumped. As there are no facilities it is isolated it would be better closed off"

"Clean up the coast to offer useable beaches during summer"

"Reduce rubbish - especially from Listerman. Seal the loop bins along the whole coast"

"The Wyndham City Council should take a leadership role in creating consistent guidelines and an intervention plan, especially if there are multiple stakeholders involved when caring for the coastline. Guidelines could outline intervention considerations and triggers and provide a clear approach to the management of seaweed on beaches within the LGA, including Wyndham Harbour Marina."

"SEAWEED has become a big problem since the construction of Wyndham Harbour. I would like to see a sea rake or similar which can remove the seaweed from the water's edge AT LOW TIDE. The tractor and rake used at the moment is somewhat useless I think. It can't remove the seaweed at the edge of the water, furthermore it buries the rubbish people leave behind and makes it hard to walk on the beach!"

"I'd suggest regular monitoring and removal of rubbish"

Safety



Comments around safety included comments around road safety, feeling unsafe and unsociable behaviours along the coast.

Respondents indicated that many of the locations on the Wyndham Coast were isolated and felt unsafe, especially Campbells Cove and the Point Cook Homestead site. Some boat shed owners indicated that there had been several break ins recently which have been reported to the police.

There were a few comments around road safety, including the need to trim back trees and shrubs as well as fix up some roads, to make it safer not only for drivers but also for cyclists and pedestrians.

Some respondents indicated that some nudists were still using the beach even though signs have been installed; this also created a sense of unease for some people.

QUOTES:

"The carparks are very unsafe, (crime wise) specially at the Point Cook Coastal Park."

"The beach road is hidden by shrubbery and care must be taken to cross it maybe safety fencing in some areas and pedestrian crossings are needed."

"For the thick bushes towards the end of Beach Rd to be cut back, to make it safe and visible for walkers to the road - I run along this path and don't feel safe towards the marina direction."

"Cycling on the roads in Werribee South and South Point Cook is not safe. Roads are in poor condition on the edges and they are very narrow."

"More police/safety presence - undesirable people"

"Try to minimise unsocial behaviour"

Infrastructure and facilities



Over 35 comments were received concerning the need for new facilities and supporting infrastructure and developments along the coast. Many people would like to see more cafés and restaurants, more developments similar to Wyndham Harbour, more toilets, BBQ's and playgrounds. There were also a few requests to develop the Pont Cook Homestead and to increase car parking.

QUOTES:

"It needs to be developed. While the beach and coastline needs to be preserved, the local infrastructure needs to be further developed such as better roads and facilities."

"Our family would like to suggest: Exercise stations along the pathway (Beach Rd) to encourage fitness and visitors to the area. One or two small playgrounds further along Beach Rd towards the Marina, to encourage more visitors to the area and would make the area feel safer for people using the pathway for walking/jogging. New toilet blocks beside the two playgrounds- the current ones are at a distance and women especially feel uncomfortable visiting these away from other people."

"The big idea is to create a vision for the coastal area that improves access, usage, generates more revenue and increases commercial business in this area. The one big idea has two components: 1. Leverage one of the following areas (Point Cook Homestead or Campbell's Cove to build a swimming and recreation area on the beach. 2. Expand the coastal development north of the Wyndham Harbour. Approve development on condition of extensive beach and coastal development."

"further develop Campbells Cove - eg picnic tables, BBQs"

"The beach has been a hidden gem in the past but needs facilities to cater for growth "

"Around this beach have a sprinkle water park, add BBQ's and picnic area/swings slides etc. not to forget adequate parking, toilet and bathroom facilities"

"Need more coffee shops, restaurants etc to create a destination at the harbour."

"Would love to see Werribee South become the next Williamstown/Altona with shops, cafes and restaurants along Beach road. It has so much potential and some of the best views of the bay!"

"Cafes, restaurants, apartments, parks, playground"

1.3 Conclusion

Overall the community members were highly engaged about the Wyndham coast. Many people appreciated the fact that council proactively popped-up across Wyndham to seek their views and were excited about the prospect of improvements to the coast. There were only a few people who indicated that they would not like to see any changes to the coast, however most respondents feel this area is a hidden gem and should be developed and shared.

74 respondents opted to 'be kept up to date' about the Wyndham Coastal Management Plan. It is now important for council to capitalise on this initial engagement by continuing the conversation and, most importantly, reporting back to people about the outcome of the initial engagement, how community feedback has been used and what future actions could be implemented as a result.



PROJECT OVERVIEW

2.1 Purpose and objectives

The purpose of the project was to consult with the Wyndham community regarding the development of a coastal management plan for the City of Wyndham.

The purpose of the engagement was to build an understanding of the things the community value and love about the Wyndham coast, what locations they know about and don't know about and what improvements they would like to see along the coast.

2.2 Target Community

The engagement activities were designed to target a broad range of people, both local and visiting, including those who use and spend time on the coast and those who do not.

One of the key success factors for this engagement was to engage with the 'hard to reach' or 'quiet majority' and gather data from both the general community and the small groups of people who spend a lot of time using the coast. This was achieved by undertaking the place-based pop-up engagements in four locations across the municipality, promoting the engagement widely, and by providing an opportunity to provide feedback and ideas online.

2.3 Community Engagement Constraints and Considerations

The Wyndham Coastline is geographically difficult to get to in some areas. Many areas are quite isolated and are not well known to the general public.

Key challenges influencing this engagement activity included:

- timing being able to engage with residents and visitors at the right time and locations.
- engaging beyond the physical area reaching residents and visitors who are not users of the coast
- weather planning for adverse weather for the place-based pop-up consultation events.

All of the above considerations influenced the engagement design and selected methodologies.

2.4 Engagement approach

The use of the ChatterBox trailer for the place-based pop-up consultations enabled engagement with people who otherwise may not have ever interacted with council or participated in traditional engagement methods. The placed-based intercept style of engagement is designed to reach people in their everyday areas and communicate with them during their normal day to day or weekend activities. The four pop-up consultations connected with a wide range of people including hard to reach groups like people from culturally diverse backgrounds, people from low socio-economic backgrounds, fisher people and visitors.

A range of engagement tools were used at the place-based pop-ups, enabling the community to provide their feedback in a variety of ways. These different tools also enabled many people to engage at the same time, which was highly beneficial during busy times.

The tools included a hard copy of the survey (mirroring the online version), a dotmocracy board, a giant chatboard and a drawing sheet targeted towards children.

Placed-based pop-up events



Four place-based pop-up consultation events were held around the City of Wyndham at the following locations/events: Saturday 24 February (Werribee Pop-Up Park), Saturday 3 March (Point Cook Po-Up Park,) Sunday 11 March (Campbell's Cove Fishing Competition) and Sunday 18 March (Werribee boat ramp.)

Survey



An online survey was developed to enable the community to provide their feedback and ideas if they were unable to attend the place-based pop-up consultation sessions. The online survey was open from 21 February until 13 April.

The online survey was hosted by Wyndham City Council through their Bang the Table and Social Pinpoint engagement platforms.

2.5 Participation profile







Over 500 written ideas and views were gathered throughout the community engagement process, via the hardcopy and online surveys.

- 152 people completed a survey, 34 online and 118 in person at the place-based pop-up consultations.
- 74 pins were placed on maps via both the online mapping tool (Social Pinpoint) and the place-based popup consultations

At the place-based pop-up events:


- 14 children and young people provided their feedback by drawing their ideas;
- 98 people engaged with the dotmocracy activity;
- 2 comments were recorded on the giant chat boards.

Of the 152 people who completed a survey:

- the most widely represented age group was people aged 35-44 years (27.6%) followed by 65-74 years (18.4%);
- 56.58% of respondents were male and 43.42% female.
- responses were received from respondents who live, work or were visiting Point Cook, Werribee and Werribee South.


Gender

Of the 152 respondents who indicated their gender, 56.58% (88) were male, 43.42% (66) were female.




Age

There was good representation of different ages, most of which fell between 25 and 74 years. There was no participation from young people aged between 12-17 years and only two under 11 years. The highest participation was from people aged 35-44 years with 27.6%.



I live, work or am visiting?

Of the 129 people who indicated where they lived, worked or were visiting, 37.9% said Point Cook, 26.3% said Werribee and 23.2% said Werribee South. This is consistent with where the place-based pop up consultations events were held.



If you live in Wyndham, how long have you lived there?

144 respondents indicated whether or not they lived in Wyndham and if they did, for how long.

Most respondents (33.3%) have lived in Wyndham for over 10 years, with 17.3% living between 6-0 years, 18.75% 2-5 years, 6.9% 1-2 years and 4.1% less than a year. 18% indicated they didn't live in Wyndham.


3. OVERALL SURVEY RESULTS

This section provides all results from the hard copy and online surveys that were completed by the community. A total of 152 surveys were completed, 34 of which were online and 118 that were at pop-up events.

The survey had a total of 10 questions: three open ended questions, five demographic questions and two closed ended question. (please find copy of survey in the appendix).


3.1 What places on the Wyndham coast have you been to and how often do you visit?

The place visited the most on a daily basis was Wyndham Harbour with 14 respondents (11.1%) visiting daily followed by Point Cook Coastal Park with 12 respondents visiting daily (10.3%) and Werribee South Boat ramp with 11 respondents (9.2%) visiting daily. The place visited the least was the Point Cook Coastal Park with 21 respondents (18.1%) indicating they have never been and 52 respondents (44.8%) visiting rarely.




K Road Cliffs

Of the 88 respondents, 11 respondents (12.5%) indicated they have never been there and 22 respondents (25%) visit rarely. One person visits daily, and 6 people visit 2-3 times per week.




Werribee South Boat Ramp

Of the 119 respondents, 23 respondents (28.6%) visited the Werribee boat ramp daily, 2-3 times per week or monthly. A further 23 respondents (28%) visited several times per year. 6 people (4%) had never been there and 23 respondents (15.3%) had rarely been there.




Campbells Cove & Baileys Beach

Of the 108 respondents, 33 respondents (30.5%) stated that they visit Campbells Cove regularly (daily, 2-3 times per week and monthly). 42 respondents (38.8%) stated that they visit several times per year and 9 people (8.3%) have never visited.




Point Cook Coastal Park

Of the 116 respondents, 7 people (6%) of respondents stated that they visited daily. The same park, however, had the highest level of respondents who had never visited it before (14%) and 34.6% who rarely visited.



Wyndham Harbour

Of the 126 respondents, 14 people (11.1%) stated that they visited daily. Being surrounded by residential housing would be a contributing factor to this. 38 respondents (30.1%) visit several times per year. 6 people (4.7%) of respondents had never visited Wyndham Harbour.






Wyndham Harbour

3.2 What areas and facilities do you use when you visit the Wyndham Coast?

147 respondents indicated which facilities they used when visiting the Wyndham Coast. Respondents were able to select those that applied from a pre-determined list of facilities.

The most visited facilities were the walking paths with just over 53%, followed by the beaches (48.2%), parkland (37.4%), picnic facilities and shelters (34.6%), Wyndham Harbour (33.3%) and the boardwalk (31.2%). 10.2% of respondents indicated that they did not visit the coastline.

3.3 What is your one big idea for the Wyndham coast?



There were 122 respondents who listed one or more big ideas for the Wyndham coast.

Cleaning up the coastline was the most frequently suggested big idea, 28 people (22.9%) made comments related to this topic. Many comments related to the cleaning up of the seaweed at Wyndham Harbour. Extending the walking and cycling trails was the second most frequently suggested big idea, seeing 23 people (18.8%) make comments about extending and connecting trails.



Other themes to emerge from the big ideas included: improving the beaches (7.3%) protecting the environment (7.3%), having more cafés and restaurants (7.3%), overall improvements to facilities (5/7%), fixing and improving local roads (4.9%), promoting the coastline and specific areas more (4.9%) and installing more picnic and BBQ facilities (3.3%).

Can't wait for the bay trail to be completed so it connects all the way to Williamstown.

To improve the beaches for swimming and recreational use enabling greater access and usage. This is not the same as other beaches around Melbourne, the Mornington and Bellarine Peninsula. It is a precious resource, vastly underutilised. Food and restaurant options are very limited too.

The Wyndham City Council should take a leadership role in creating consistent guidelines and an intervention plan, especially if there are multiple stakeholders involved when caring for the coastline. Guidelines could outline intervention considerations and triggers and provide a clear approach to the management of seaweed on beaches within the LGA, including Wyndham Harbour Marina.

When piles of decomposing seaweed blanket coastal beaches, worth treasuring, more should be done to look after the coastlines. Taking into account, the widespread public outcry over the years, a consistent, clear and collaborative intervention plan is needed to overturn the public perception around this issue. This plan should also include a communication strategy to keep all stakeholders informed of the progress. In absence of an existing plan, the Wyndham City Council needs to take urgent action to deal with rotting seaweed already stranded, along the LGA coastline.

3.4 What do you love or value about the Wyndham coast?



119 respondents responded to this question.

More than 20% of respondents indicated that they love that the Wyndham coast was close to home and the city, that they valued the natural, untouched environment (18.4%), the beaches (15.1%), the peace and quiet (12.6%), the natural beauty (10.9%) and the fishing (9.2%). They also loved that it was easy to get to, and loved the parks, the birds and wildlife and the walking and cycling paths. 'Unique' was often a word used to describe the Wyndham coast.

3.5 Do you have any other comments about the Wyndham coast or the Coastal Management Plan?

75 respondents provided further comments about the coast or coastal management plan. Similar themes emerged from these comments, such as the need to link the walking and bike trails (16 comments), the need to keep the coast clean from dumped rubbish, seaweed and general rubbish (10 comments), general safety (5 comments) and the need for new facilities (5 comments).

A new theme to emerge was the issues around car parks; 10 comments specifically mentioned car park issues, including rubbish being dumped within car parks (especially around the car park on the corner of Duncan's and Beach Roads,) criminal activity in carparks, (especially at the Point Cook Coastal Park,) the need to improve/expand off-road parking at Werribee South, increase parking at the Wyndham Harbour and the overall need to increase parking along the coast.

- So close to RAMSAR area could attract bird watchers if bird hides
- Coastal planting need more! on foreshore/entrances to Werribee South / incentives for residents to plant. Hide marked (sic) garden. Unique opportunity to plant Werribee South in original plants.
- What did our Aboriginal people do on the coast? Where? How can we highlight this? And educate/enlighten the community.
- Need to manage seaweed on beaches and at the Marina. It stinks.
- Need doggie poo bags on walking tracks
- Farmers market on the foreshore?
- Roads into Werribee south are a disgrace mud not enough being done to stop. Bad first impression / not safe!
- Roads also need upgrading particularly Duncans Rd. It is unsafe
- Coastguard building & garden need upgrade DESPERATELY.
- 1. Much of the completion of the bike route could be achieved by widening the shoulder of a road.
- 2. Wyndham Harbour to Campbells Cove should be unpaved to retain the ambience.
- 3.Put signs up and tell people about the fantastic link from Werribee to Werribee park along the river the path has been there for ages.
- 4.Link Skeleton Creek to Point Cook Park
- 5.Leave Campbells Cove untouched
- 1. Retain the Fishermen's huts at Campbell's Cove and Baily's Beach.
- 2. Don't remove any trees from the K Road Cliff area. The dead ones help stabilise the banks.
- 3. Stop further expansion of Wyndham Harbour.

As I and friends often use the coastal cycle paths from Williamstown to Point Cook I would like to see these paths further developed to extend past the current stopping point at Point Cook suburb and incorporate the coastal stretch all the way to the Werribee River.

I live in Wyndham Harbour and love it here but feel it should be so much better. Myself and many residents feel that the developer is taking many shortcuts and the council are turning a blind eye! Some examples are;

- -foreshore not maintained,
- -disgusting smell of rotting seaweed,
- -no park for children,
- very unsafe Duncans Rd between Whites and Beach Rd,
- council approving a gym for 1000+ residents that is the size of a lounge room and is a portable building that was delivered onsite which is an eyesore!
- lack of trees/shade cover along the walking track in Wyndham Harbour

I regularly cycle from Williamstown to Sanctuary Lakes. It would be really great to be able to continue the ride to Point Cook (homestead) and beyond.

I hear that the cafe at Point Cook homestead is closed - this would be an ideal destination for cyclists if the bike track continued

I think this area should have top priority by council. There should be a bike/running/walking path connecting Point Cook coastal park with Werribee south. That would also make the area more accessible and fell safer. I think this is Wyndham's biggest asset and still it is probably the most undeveloped coastal area in Port Phillip Bay Area. The new beaches at Wyndham marina are a massive missed opportunity as people don't use them because they are relative remote, and people just don't feel safe there. There are no cafes overlooking the area and no traffic/car parking like in Altona (just next to the beach area).

I would hope that when the streets for the easternmost blocks of Saltwater Coast estate are built that the residents have direct access to the Immigration Monument Lookout instead of having to drive to Point Cook Homestead and then walk a kilometre back to it.

I would like to see more care taken to make it more visitor friendly and clean it up a lot more.

- 3. Remove/fix the rotting seaweed problem around Werribee South and Marina complex.
- 4. Improve/expand off-road parking at Werribee South.
- 5. Make major improvements to Point Cook coastal park to in orange more usage.
- 6. Add more parkland area on the edge of water and improve expansion the beach area. If this means importing sand then do it,
- 7. Make changes to Campbell's Cove so it can be used by all people not just a few. Improve the road, remove the bathing boxes and remove the nudist beach. Leverage this area.
- 8. Put in walk and cycle paths along the entire length of the coastline (from Werribee South to Williamstown trail)
- 9. Improve the Jet Ski area launching and parking.
- 10. Look to provide an alternative road into Werribee South, say Farm Road, to remove the traffic on Duncan's Road and the multi-usage with market garden machinery.

An overhaul or improvement or creation of larger amounts of sand for children to play in.

Safer water areas to play or swim in, such as the area that Eastern Beach in Geelong created - the Eastern Beach Swimming Enclosure, where a swimming pool effect has been created in the sea.

One or two small playgrounds further along Beach Rd towards the Marina, to encourage more visitors to the area and would make the area feel safer for people using the pathway for walking/jogging.

New toilet blocks beside the two playgrounds- the current ones are at a distance and women especially feel uncomfortable visiting these away from other people.

Please clean parkland near Werribee river mouth

Please continue the Bay West cycling trail to Werribee South. It would be a great asset to both cyclists and the local community.

Please manage to get a decent beach in point cook area

pollution is a big issue - I noticed filters for storm water have been installed at Altona beach. I think the whole bay would benefit from this

remove overgrowth, more bins, dog poo bags, parking on beach road

SEAWEED has become a big problem since the construction of Wyndham Harbour. I would like to see a sea rake or similar which can remove the seaweed from the water's edge AT LOW TIDE. The tractor and rake used at the moment is somewhat useless I think. It can't remove the seaweed at the edge of the water, furthermore it buries the rubbish people leave behind and makes it hard to walk on the beach! The seaweed smells makes the water murky and very uninviting. Unfortunately, it is very rare to get a day with clear water... it has stopped me and a lot of other people from swimming at this beautiful beach.

RUBBISH - people who don't care about this great spot come down and dump their rubbish (garden, rubbish, bricks, tyres etc.) The worst spot seems to be at and around the car part on the corner of Duncan's and Beach Roads. Take a look in the bushes 50m to the right of the car park! It breaks my heart. I think it would be a good idea to install security cameras in this area to catch the people who do this.

The whole area suffers from people dumping and leaving their rubbish... I pick up rubbish from the beach every day. It would be good to get rubbish pickers to work the area a couple time a week. I think there are enough bins... the problem is people don't care and dump there rubbish everywhere even next to a bin!

Should connect the federation trail to the bay trail under the freeway.

So much of the coastline has limited access.

Something that has been needed for a long time., particular given the councils tag line of city, coast, country......

Stingy smell of seaweed always bit of a shocker. I would like to see more carparks with big walking space. At this point walking path ends at Wyndham Harbour would love to see extended walking path to Campbells Cove.

The carparks are very unsafe, (crime wise) specially at the Point Cook coastal park.

the Werribee river is amazing. it's the highlight

There are large volumes of decomposing seaweed emitting a foul stench between Altona Meadows and Werribee South beaches. A quick web search pointed out that the breakdown of seaweed produces Hydrogen Sulphide gas (or rotten egg gas), which is commonly found in sulphur springs, swamps and sewage treatment plants.

This nauseating odour impacts our everyday activities. From opening windows of a home or a car, using a clothes line, or evaporative cooling, going for a walk, taking children to a local park, or going for a swim at a nearby beach.

Wyndham City Council is obliged, to protect and manage the LGA foreshore on behalf of all Victorians. Specifically, the Council should have guidelines or plans in place to coordinate approaches and resources to manage rotting seaweed. As other, local governments documented in their guidelines for the management of seaweed accumulations, there are potential risks to public safety, health concerns, recreational and commercial use of the locations, visual amenity, impacts upon tourism and local business.

Newspaper articles dating back to 2016, reported over 400 residents complained to the EPA about the stench. Damiain Well, EPAs Executive Director of Regional Services, confirmed that large amounts of seagrass and macroalgae banked up between Altona Meadows and Werribee South beaches, was the source of the stench (The Age article). Despite the public concern, the Wyndham City Council is yet to intervene to address this problem.

To further develop Campbells Cove - eg; picnic tables, BBQs etc. Litter is a big problem

try to minimise unsocial behaviour

use the coast to our advantage, consider promoting Wyndham Harbour. think about developing it so that the middle class working communities can also enjoy things like a party boat cruise etc

we are concerned about the smell from the coast as well

We desperately need the bicycle paths to be linked up with the River Path and the Bay Trail

We have a precious area of land which needs to be protected from urban encroachment and developed mainly for passive tourist and recreational uses.

we must work together

we really would like to have a clean beach, as at the moment, there is no water area that we can go for a swim. Werribee river is a disgrace - Werribee south end

Werribee South beach is finally becoming a popular recreational spot but I think parking areas are limited to cater for the number of people who will want to use it in the future in comparison to the parking available at Williamstown and Altona beaches.

Presently I walk our two small dogs there, I am very nervous about the dogs that are off lead even though there is plenty of signage, so many people think their dog wouldn't chase another dog but I have had some frightening incidents in the past.

A public toilet facility at the bottom of Duncan's road in the car park would be useful for people at that end of the beach.

The beach has been a hidden gem in the past but needs facilities to cater for growth.

The beach road is hidden by shrubbery and care must be taken to cross it maybe safety fencing in some areas and pedestrian crossings are needed.

A lifesaving club may also become a necessity in the future

With this survey, it asked how many times you visited a site, i.e. Campbells Cove, with limited options - my option may have been better stated that as once a year, twice a year, or every two years for some places, rather than what was selected.

4. MAPPING

74 pins and comments were received during both the place-based pop-up consultations and the Social Pinpoint mapping tool on the Council website.
56 pins were to indicate areas for improvement and 18 pins were to indicate places that respondents loved about the Wyndham Coast.

Respondents were able to upload photos via the social pinpointing tool on Council's website. Three of these can be seen below.

4.1 Improvements

56 pins were used to show areas for improvements across the Wyndham Coast. Most suggestions for improvements via the mapping tool were for walking and cycling trails (39.2%), followed by the need to manage pollution including rubbish and seaweed (10.7%). Other areas for improvement included roads, management development, protect the environment, more playgrounds, more BBQ/Picnic areas and develop the beaches.

5. PLACE-BASED POP-UP ENGAGEMENT

5.1 Overview

The approach used for the place-based engagement activities was the ChatterBox pop-up trailer platform. This platform is a bright yellow, custom built mobile trailer that has been specifically designed to take creative and fun engagement tools to locations where people already are present.

The pop-up trailer went out to four different locations across Wyndham, including shopping centres, pop-up parks and coastal locations.

The location and timing of the pop-ups were carefully selected to ensure the engagement activities intersected with busy periods or specific events, providing the best chance to connect with a broad range of community members who are typically hard to reach.

Most locations were selected with the purpose to engage and connect with community members from a particular group, including fisher people, the general community, residents and users of coastal venues.

5.2 Pop-up trailer engagement tools

The tools used as part of the pop-up platform were specifically designed to:

- gather data that aligned with the Wyndham Coastal Management Plan survey
- enable people to get involved in a range of ways, especially if they felt uncomfortable filling in a survey or were time poor
- encourage responses from a diverse range of people including children.

The table below outlines the pop-up platform engagement tools that were used.



Not all tools were used at every pop-up location. The tools selected for each location were based on the space available at each site, the main audience being targeted and the weather.

In total, over 145 ideas and views were gathered through the place-based consultation activities (chatboards, dotmocracy, big ideas drawings sheets etc) as well as 116 surveys being completed on-site. An additional 13 surveys were distributed to the community to complete at home. Furthermore, the place-based activities enabled engagement with people that otherwise may not have participated in traditional council engagement methods, including children, busy parents/carers, older people, people with a disability, people with low literacy levels and people from low socio-economic backgrounds.

The breakdown of the type of participation by pop-up is shown in the chart and graph below.

The locations with the high participation rates (Werribee and Point Cook) were a result of attendance at the pop-up parks where there were a large number of people. The low participation rate at the Werribee boat ramp was due to extreme weather (wind/rain/thunderstorms).



5.3 Overall Findings

Dotmocracy

A total of 98 people participated in the dotmocracy activity at the four place-based pop-up events. The dotmocracy activity asked people if they knew about certain locations on the Wyndham coast, including whether they had been there, whether they knew about it, or whether they knew about it but hadn't been. K Road Cliffs was the least known location with 40.8% of respondents indicating they did not know about it. This was followed by Campbells Cove and Baileys Beach with 34.6% of respondents indicating they did not know about it, and jetty and fishing with 28.5% of respondents indicating they were not aware of it. The most well-known and most visited location was Wyndham Harbour, where 78.5% of respondents had been and a further 12.2% of respondents indicated they knew about but had not been. This was followed by 61.2% of respondents who stated they had visited the walking and cycling paths.

Participation and engagement



The Werribee place-based pop-up engagement was held on Saturday 24 February between 4:30pm-7:30pm and was part of the Werribee Pop-Up Park.

Approximately 60 people were engaged.

While the location of the pop-up trailer was effective as we were part of the pop-up park, the day was overcast with the threat of rain, so the event attracted low numbers.

There were 2 comments written on the Chatboard in Werribee.






A total of 41 people participated in the dotmocracy activity at the pop-up event in Point Cook. Many people were not aware of many of the locations along the coast including K Road Cliffs with 69.7% of respondents not knowing about it. Most people were also unaware of Campbells Cove and Baileys Beach (60.4%) and the jetty and fishing opportunities (53.4%). Wyndham Harbour was the most known location with 90.6% of participants having been there or stating that they knew about it. Point Cook coastal park was also well known by participants with 67.4% having visited or having known about it.

A total of 17 people participated in the dotmocracy activity at the pop-up event at Campbells Cove and Baileys Beach. The majority of participants had been to or knew about most locations; obviously Campbells Cove was the most visited followed by Wyndham Harbour where 88.2% had visited. The least known locations fo the participants at Campbells Cove were K Road Cliffs, where 35.2% indicated they did not know about it, followed by Werribee South Parklands where 29.4% indicated the same.


